Examples of Global and international Perspectives and Awareness

- Comparing policies/practices/case studies from Australia and another country.
- Include multicultural workshops, round-table discussions, and ask students to critically evaluate and compare the impact of an issue/topic on [Country X] and [Country Y]
- Students work in culturally diverse groups with students from a range of social, cultural and religious backgrounds and prove them with support to ensure equitable relationships.
- Ask students to use electronic links and networks (eg, email, videoconference, chat groups) to communicate with students or professionals in other countries.
- Use recently published international textbooks, journal articles and conference proceedings.

Academic expertise of lecturers and scholars as a learning resource	→	Use the cultural diversity and expertise of international students as a resource for highlighting different values/perspectives	→	Encourage students from different cultural backgrounds to contribute relevant examples (e.g., professional practices, social norms, workplace rules) from their home country or community
